A Social and Critical Introduction to Psychoanalysis

A 10 week online evening course

Programme 2023

How might we take a critical approach to psychoanalytic thought and practice? In what ways can we ensure that psychoanalysis is grounded in the contemporary social field? This course is offered as an introduction to how the foundations of psychoanalysis can be examined and interrogated, a forum to discuss how psychoanalytic ideas can be put to work in new ways that help us understand and respond to the crises and challenges of life in 2023. Taught by members of the Society for Social and Critical Psychoanalysis, this course will address questions including: How might social inequalities produce states of abjection in working class communities? What can Freud's famous patient, the Rat Man, tell us about the relation between capitalism and masculinity? Is melancholia an idea that can help us think about the immigrant experience? What do we refer to when we talk of feminine sexuality? Along the way we will draw upon neglected figures from the history of psychoanalysis, such as Sándor Ferenczi, whose radical ideas about mutuality challenge classical assumptions about clinical practice; we will ask questions about the nature of the bond between analyst and patient, discussing how to be open to difference and the dangers of colonising the other. Over the past 125 years, encounters between psychoanalytic thinking and other disciplines such as Marxism, feminism, and queer theory have generated a rich, dense, heterogenous body of thought that we will bring to bear upon topics that touch our daily lives, including dreams, time and politics.

This course will be of interest to those who are curious about the relevance of psychoanalysis to the dilemmas and questions posed by contemporary life. For those interested in embarking upon a full psychoanalytic training, the course will provide an entry point into psychoanalytic thought and practice within the culture of the SSCP. The course can also serve as CPD for counsellors and therapists who want to invigorate their clinical practice with new and diverse ideas.

Seminars will be led in different ways according to the different teachers: some will be lectures while others may be more unstructured. There will be ample opportunity for discussion and questions. There are no formal entry requirements for the course, but those who are able to engage with the set texts tend to be more able to participate in the seminars and subsequently benefit more from the course. Most core readings will be made accessible online.

General Information

The course will run online over Zoom, on Thursday evenings (6pm-8pm), over ten weeks from 14th September to 16th November 2023.

The fee is £225. There are limited spaces on the course so early booking is recommended.

Introducing Social and Critical Psychoanalysis

Dr Sally Sales

This opening seminar will be a broad introduction to the culture of the SSCP training. It will be in two parts: the first part will introduce the critical thinking of the SSCP training by comparing some of the key foundational concepts that shape psychoanalysis across its various traditions. We will look at the various psychoanalytic schools and critically compare how differently they have theorised and clinically applied these concepts. The second part of the evening will critically consider the place that psychoanalysis occupies in the social field. Drawing on the work of Foucault we will explore how far psychoanalysis emerged as a support for a particular form of family life. Does psychoanalysis today continue to uphold and transmit specific familial, classed, gendered and raced forms of subjectivity?

Over the course of this evening we will look at dreams from three quite different perspectives: firstly Freud, who sees dreams as emanating from the repressed unconscious, locating them alongside other 'symptoms' in the register of pathology; secondly Žižek, for whom dreams are idealised reflections of our consumerist society—ideological rather than pathological; and thirdly Roustang, who asks if dreams might represent a creative resource which, if handled correctly, can alleviate suffering through self-authorisation.

Sándor Ferenczi – His Life and Works

Sándor Ferenczi was a Hungarian psychologist and psychoanalyst who was born in 1873 and died in 1933. He was a close associate of Sigmund Freud and a prominent member of the early psychoanalytic movement. In this seminar, we will examine Ferenczi's contributions to the field of psychoanalysis including his work on child development, the idea of 'active intervention' in therapy, and the concept of 'mutual analysis' (i.e., that psychoanalytic treatment should involve a collaborative and participatory relationship between the patient and the analyst). We will also address how Ferenczi's ideas were influential in the development of interpersonal and relational psychoanalysis. Despite his impact on the field, Ferenczi's ideas were controversial in his time and he was often at odds with other prominent psychoanalysts. Nevertheless, his ideas and legacy continue to be studied and debated by psychoanalysts and psychologists today.

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The Genealogy of Feminine Sexuality

What does feminine sexuality mean? What is between female and feminine in a psychoanalytic sense? Psychoanalysis and feminism have been in constant dialogue for decades. To this day a cohesive psychoanalytic theory of feminine sexuality has not emerged. This seminar asks why. The aim for this seminar is to examine the psychoanalytic genealogy of feminine sexuality, exploring how the ideas of Freud and Lacan may be relevant to ongoing debates within feminism and psychoanalysis. Through a critical reading of Joan Riviere's classic paper, Womanliness as Masquerade, we will also think about how race operates within the construction of feminine sexuality, and how racialised fantasies are necessary to the coherence of White feminine subjectivity.

The Unpast - in Search of Lost Time - an Overview of Psychoanalytic Perceptions of Temporality

Psychoanalysis is replete with time travel, be it through memories, both voluntary and involuntary, transference or afterwardsness. It is not surprising, therefore, that several theorists and practitioners, such as Jean Laplanche and Andre Green, became interested in making explicit the notion of time from within Freud's oeuvre and, furthermore, developing these concepts for a contemporary psychoanalysis.

This teaching will summarise some understandings of time in both theory and practice. Furthermore, there are useful intersections with psychoanalytic time and literature (Proust), where time has long been imagined at a psychical level. We shall also look at an overlapping with philosophy (Bergson and Deleuze) as well as relevance to psychosocial theory.

In this seminar we will explore the ideas of abjection/social abjection as one way to think about how inequalities may produce and exacerbate troubled psychological states. Following a brief introduction to the theory, we will use practice examples to consider: what do these ideas offer to our practice of social and critical psychoanalysis? How might the use of this theory shape what we hear, see, and feel in the clinical encounter?

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Love Escapes Extinction: Melancholic Subject, Melancholic World

In 'Mourning and Melancholia', Freud writes about a kind of loss that leaves the subject impoverished and empty, filled with self-hatred. Psychiatric discourse names this as depression, but what if rather than pathology, this says something about contemporary subjectivity? If we are constituted out of our ambivalent ties to those on whom we depend, and neoliberal economics is a project of ruthless individualism, perhaps melancholia is a way of navigating this bind. In this seminar we will explore how Freud's formulations have been put to work in theorising how certain forms of love cannot be mourned, and live on in us as phantoms. We will look at the foreclosure of queer desire, the demand to assimilate into Whiteness and the destruction of the non-human world.
